



About Sarracenia

North American Pitcher Plants (Genus *Sarracenia*) come primarily from swamps, fens and grassy plains that remain permanently wet in the south-eastern coastal plain of the United States. One species, *Sarracenia purpurea* can be found far into Canada.

There are between 8 and 11 species in the genus *Sarracenia*. All have a tubular leaf shape for trapping insects. They digest the insects and use them as an extra food source since they typically grow in nutrient-poor boggy soil.

With their limited range, habitat loss is a primary concern for maintaining healthy *Sarracenia* populations. Estimates from the early 1990s suggest that 97.5% of suitable habitat for *Sarracenia* has been destroyed in the United States. Development of land, fire suppression, chemical runoff and cutting of pitchers for the floral industry are the biggest threats to pitcher plants.
